Khalifa Goes to Barbury.....again!

Little did I know what was in store when I wrote "Khalifa Goes to Barbury" for you last season!

You may recall I shared our pleasure riding experiences from Barbury Castle where he broke his bridle and I rode him in nothing but a Dually headcollar!

This year, however, things would be rather different: 2013 was to be Khalifa's Novice season ... and he got off to a fantastic start, with a Grade 1 for his first Novice ride, and so his success continued... all grade 1's for each of his 40k Novice rides. So when the request came from Endurance GB for nominations for a Novice horse to represent England in the Home International at Barbury Castle in August, I couldn't help thinking quietly to myself "Well Khalifa can do it!" You

can imagine my surprise and delight when he made the “long list”... and then the “short list”... and then the “final selection” ... for the Home International England SQUAD! We were going to Barbury... again!

As the event drew ever closer, the nerves began to surface. We were faced with a barrage of e mails from the Team vet, the Team farrier and the Team physio, not to mention the Team, Chef D’Equipe, Maggie Pattinson. We were instructed and directed on a plethora of issues with strict standards, expectations and ground rules being laid. Pre-event preparations were exciting but also a little daunting. Two days before the trip our last minute preparations began to take shape. Khalifa was bathed and coiffed and, although I say so myself, looked quite amazing! He looked like a real Arabian show horse, complete with gleaming plaits, silky tail and dark glistening eyes. He really was given “the works” by an Arabian Showing expert! A far cry from the usual rough and tumble urchin boy that he usually is!

We set off on a warm August Thursday morning, for our long journey to Barbury Castle, near Marlborough in Wiltshire, feeling both excited and nervous at the same time. I should explain at this point that three horses were selected for each endurance class in the Home International and this made up the England SQUAD. Not until the Friday evening would the Chef announce the final selection – just one horse and rider combination for each class; these horses would form the England TEAM and ride on the big day for Team points.

From the moment we arrived the pressure was on! Meetings, briefings, trot ups, inspections, stable visits, farrier checks, physio checks, vet checks, kit distributed, air jackets fitted, expectations re-iterated ... and so it went on, whilst all the time, the tension mounted.

Then came the final briefing on Friday evening, when “the team” would be announced. There was an air of expectation, a more subdued squad and rather less laughter... this was the big moment we had all been waiting for. We were under no illusions though; even if not selected to ride for points, we were riding in England kit, as part of the Squad, and were expected to conduct ourselves accordingly. The Chef D’equipe had made that abundantly clear from the start! Words cannot describe that moment when the name of the Novice horse was announced. Our delight was indescribable when Khalifa’s name was called: the Novice horse, representing the England Team, is Khalifa BJ, to be ridden by Novice rider, Carolyn Livesey from Lancashire! I turned to Carolyn to say “Well done” but the words just wouldn’t come... I was too choked to speak! I can honestly say that this was the first time I had ever wished that I was a Novice rider!! Instead, as an advanced rider, I was to be confined to crewing, alongside David, my husband who had expertly crewed Zim Nazka at FEI level and successfully crewed Khalifa throughout his novice season to date ... and, of course, to motivating Carolyn who had only ever ridden two novice rides previously! I could see the realisation of the enormity of the situation dawning on her, and knew I would need to do some

calming and coaching! Carolyn is a recent “convert” to Endurance and this was to be a major baptism of fire! What a moment for her!

On the Saturday there was excitement in the air! The weather was glorious, the stables were decorated with England flags and bunting and so were all of our trailers, as we set about putting the finishing touches to our fantastic horses! Then followed an enormous parade of all of the Home International Squad horses, riders and crews from England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales complete with flags and marching, horses in fancy dress, horses being ridden, horses being led... and some totally disguised as “dragons” whilst others were resplendent in full suits of armour and ridden by princesses and regal knights! It was a truly proud moment and a moving and spectacular sight. If you haven’t seen the photographs do go onto the website and take a look! I had my doubts about how “Baby Khalifa” would cope with all of this razzamatazz... oh ye of little faith! He took it all in his stride as the “novice” amongst the seasoned horses ... and even played his part comically by removing the flag I waved in my hand and proceeding to parade with it in his own mouth!!

Next came the serious part – when we had to present all Squad horses to vetting. This was done with great aplomb and spectacle too, with all horses being paraded in England rugs as a squad, prior to vetting. It was of course a nerve-wracking moment ... but all went well and all horses passed the vetting.

After tacking up and warming up, with nerves jangling, Carolyn and Khalifa were timed out across the starting line and I watched through very proud and tearful eyes as they disappeared into the distance and over the top of that famous Barbury hill! Now it was time for me to stress! I am NOT a seasoned crewer so I had to patiently allow David to “show me the ropes”. It felt very strange to be crewing my own horse and I think I made my mind up that day that I was definitely destined to be in the saddle and not in the driving seat! I have the utmost admiration for all crews everywhere and will never take my crew for granted again! They do a fantastic job and are the “unsung heroes” in this wonderful discipline that is “Endurance” without whom, we would not and could not be successful!

Khalifa and Carolyn had a brilliant ride. They were both amazingly professional and followed all instructions issued to them from the Management Team and as dictated in the Home International Rules. They completed the ride strictly as instructed, as close to 11.00kph as possible – any deviation from this would incur penalty points for the team. They came in at 11.1kph! We presented Khalifa to vetting early, within a few short minutes of the thirty minute allowance, as directed by the team vet, with a heart rate of 42, giving him a Grade 1. Well done Carolyn and Khalifa! They had achieved maximum points for the England Team!! We were extremely proud and it was a fantastic experience. It was an honour to have been selected, a thrill to be part of the Squad, a proud moment to represent the England team and a success we will remember for a long time to come.
